

About the Catalog

The University Catalog serves as the official source for program curricula, course descriptions, academic policies, and procedures governing course registration and degree completion. It is available online, with options to download individual pages or the complete catalog as a PDF.

This catalog supplements the NDSU website and materials from the Office of Admission, the Graduate School, and the academic units. It contains academic policies, official program curricula, and course descriptions relevant to all students. Undergraduate and professional students refer to the admission and undergraduate sections, while graduate students should consult the graduate section for all information including admission. The catalog also links directly to the official websites of the colleges, departments, and student resources for the most current details. The academic policies and information are effective for the published academic year. An archive of past catalogs is available.

Undergraduate curricula are effective for students declaring their program in the publication year and are subject to the baccalaureate degree and graduation requirements.
